





Alabamians experiencing food insecurity










Peer-Learning Workshops

- 3 multi-day, convening led by Aspen Institute's Community Strategies Group (CSG)
- Dedicated time and space
- Team-building and cross-team learning
- Homework assignments between workshops

Family-Centric **Approaches



- Family pathways and outcomes model
- Shift from case-management towards family-centered coaching
- Guidance from Family Expertise Council

Database Software

- EmpowOR software to collect and analyze data
- Saw in action in Garrett County
- Reliable metrics to measure progress



It is really helpful that the data are right at your finger tips instead of digging through files or going to each other's offices. We already have a lot of funders asking about data. They want to see improvement with data.

Start-up Investment

- \$5,000 stipend for each agency
- \$100,000 per team to implement their Hubs
- \$10,000 in technical assistance and capacity building

- Advisory committee of local funders, private sector employers, social service leaders



Understand the Landscape



- Need to understand context
- Utilize expertise
- Voices of impacted populations

There was a debate among members about how to map access to services, and a Family Expertise Council member ended up drawing the best path. I strongly felt at that second convening that the family perspective was starting to gel."











Voices of Impacted Populations

- Formalize your process
- Value voices
- Requires changing how you do business
- Pay for their expertise









How to BUILD Collaborations

Invite the Right Partners



- Committed to capacity building
- Share values
- May not work that's OK

When all of us came to the table, we realized we were providing these services individually to similar families, but not in collaboration. And we thought, 'Wow! Look how much more of an impact we can have just bringing all of us to the table."

- Follow-up!















Peer Advice




